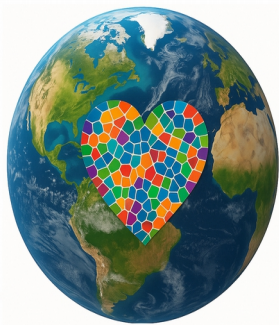

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CHAPTER 1 – THE STATE OF HUMANITY

- living within these limits

Whoever ignores limits does not destroy the systems of others — they destroy the system in which they themselves live.

4.6 Respect for truth
